The Board has had a busy winter. Our township outreach has continued, starting with the November meeting at Dexter Township Hall with Supervisor Pat Kelly. We discussed matters of interest in the Township and interactions with PBWOA issues. Prior to the meeting we had discussions with Hamburg Township about a potential new ordinance regarding the Base Lake sandbar complaints about partying. The Hamburg Supervisor and a trustee were at our meeting for an excellent multi-Township discussion.

In December we met at the Webster Township Hall with Supervisor John Kingsley for a township update and a good discussion.

In January we met at the Zukey Lake Tavern. In order to better educate the Board, we received a presentation from two lake scientists from Restorative Lake Sciences, LLC, a lake management/science firm. We learned about and discussed weed control, invasive species, lake and river management and many other issues relating to our chain of lakes ecosystem. At meetings we have also discussed possible conservation/preservation areas, lake water testing, Dick Knight's survey of the number of boats on our waters (see Page 3), potential grants for lake and lakefront improvements, involvement with Hamburg Township's proposed Accessory Building Ordinance, the Flook Dam and many other chain of lakes issues.

Our upcoming meetings are presently scheduled as follows: February we will be meeting at the Hamburg Township Hall with Supervisor Hohl and a presentation by Kieser & Associates for further education, thoughts and recommendations as to lake management/science/engineering issues. March will be at Klave's Marina. April will be at the Putnam Township offices with Supervisor Ron Rau. All PBWOA members are welcome. 


Update on PBWOA Water Testing

This past summer, residents from Portage, Baseline, Whitewood, and Tamarack measured water quality in their lakes through the State of Michigan's Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program. The threat of increasing phosphorus and algae blooms is an all too real threat for Michigan's lakes, and tracking these parameters can help lakes associations make wise management decisions.


The monitoring has shown that Portage, Baseline, Whitewood, and Tamarack are mesotrophic lakes. This means that there is a moderate amount of nutrients on the water; enough to allow for plentiful fish production, but not enough to cause dangerous algae blooms. Still, on lakes surrounded by houses, there is plenty of opportunity for phosphorus to enter the lakes and create localized problems, and it is very important to keep an eye on those levels.

A full report will be available by the end of January and will be given to the PBWOA board. Until then, below are two examples of the types of measurements made.



Caption: Measuring the depth of light penetration is done with a Secchi disk. While this is an inexpensive and easy way to understand the productivity of a lake,

it is not a fool proof check of the amount of algae production in a lake. For example, the increase in water clarity in Baseline Lake over time is probably due to zebra mussels just as much as the installation of a sewer system.



Caption: Volunteers used a meter to measure the water temperature and amount of dissolved oxygen throughout the water column. In Whitewood Lake (shown above), as well as Baseline and Tamarack, which were also measured, dissolved oxygen is absent from a depth of 25-30 feet in the late summer. Fisherman take note!



We have just received the complete, 24-page report from HRWC and it contains some good news. It recommends testing Portage, Base and Tamarack water quality only once every 3 years because those lakes have shown steady improvement. However, the report suggests increased efforts at monitoring and reporting invasive species. We'll provide more information on the report at a future date.

Boat Survey—2013

With partial support from PBWOA, one of our long-time members, Dick Knight, regularly conducts a count of the number of boats on our chain of lakes. Dick was especially thorough in 2013 and included all of the lakes from Little Portage through Zukey. He counted not just boats on lifts or moored. Launch sites and marinas are also included as are boats on trailers and behind garages. The survey separated boats by type. This brief summary does not do justice to the amount of work that went into the survey. The counts for Base and Portage Lakes include boats on canals, lagoons and outlots. The grand total count was **5217** boats.
